Course Overview:

This course is designed to equip PhD students with the necessary skills to prepare, structure, and write a high-quality term paper. The course will provide hands-on guidance in topic selection, thesis formulation, drafting, editing, and presenting research findings in a scholarly format. By the end of the course, students will have developed a well-structured term paper that meets academic standards.

Course Objectives:

- To explain the purpose and structure of a scholarly term paper.
- To conduct an effective literature review and synthesize existing research.
- To develop a strong thesis statement and logical argumentation.
- To improve academic writing skills, including clarity, coherence, and conciseness.
- To learn to use proper referencing and citation styles to maintain academic integrity.
- Edit and proofread their term paper for coherence, grammar, and format.
- Present their research findings effectively in written and oral forms.

Course Learning Outcomes:

This course will enable scholars to:

CLO 1 Demonstrate the ability to conceptualize and develop a structured term paper.

CLO 2 Exhibit proficiency in academic writing conventions and research methodologies.

CLO 3 Produce a well-organized, evidence-based, and original academic paper.

CLO 4 Confidently present and defend their research work before peers and faculty.



The purpose of term paper is to build understanding of the research scholar in identified area of research. Theme of research paper may be identified collectively by Research Supervisor and Research Scholar.

Key Guidelines

- Depending upon broad topic researchers wants to pursue, research supervisor may ask scholar to develop, either one detailed term paper on selected theme or one limited term paper along with one generic presentation on mutually identified theme/s.
- The structure of term paper will be mutually decided by the supervisor and scholar. The decision will be based on the decision, whether term paper will be aimed at describing the concepts using literature, explaining the developments in the field, highlighting major academic debates, or exploring and analysing the domain based on existing data or the purpose is to synthesis the knowledge from existing literature.
- A full term paper should usually be between 2500 to 5000 words.
- A term paper should be written by following typical academic writing conventions. (structure of paper, formatting style, bibliographic conventions etc.)
- Through this course, students will have developed a high-quality term paper that is well-researched, structured, and written with academic integrity.
- At the end of the course, students will have developed a well-structured term paper that meets academic standards. This paper will be presented to RAC. (+ 2 – 3 members appointed from FDC, VC Nominee)

To support research scholars with writing skills Faculty Doctoral Committee (FDC) may organize a seminar. Depending upon need identification by FDC, this seminar may focus on any of the specific topics covering research methodology, literature review, writing skills etc.

Developing and Structuring Term paper

- Tutorials for identifying credible sources (journal articles, books, conference papers).
- Identifying introduction to literature review techniques (thematic, chronological, conceptual).
- Guided session on note-taking and summarizing research papers.
- Interactive session regarding developing research questions and hypotheses.
- Guided session on writing a strong thesis statement and argument development.

Drafting Term Paper

- Peer review session on thesis statements and argument flow.
- Hands-on interactive session on writing for body paragraphs and conclusion.

Course Overview:

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- The structure of term paper will be mutually decided by the supervisor and scholar. The decision will be based on the decision, whether term paper will be aimed at describing the concepts using literature, explaining the developments in the field, highlighting major academic debates, or exploring and analysing the domain based on existing data or the purpose is to synthesis the knowledge from existing literature.
- A full term paper should usually be between 2500 to 5000 words.
- A term paper should be written by following typical academic writing conventions. (structure of paper formatting style, bibliographic conventions etc.)
- Through this course, students will have developed a high-quality term paper that is well-researched, structured, and written with academic integrity.
- At the end of the course, students will have developed a well-structured term paper that meets academic standards. This paper will be presented to RAC. (+ 2 – 3 members appointed from FDC, VC Nominee)

To support research scholars with writing skills Faculty Doctoral Committee (FDC) may organize a seminar. Depending upon need identification by FDC, this seminar may focus on any of the specific topics covering research methodology, literature review, writing skills etc.

Developing and Structuring Term paper

- Tutorials for identifying credible sources (journal articles, books, conference papers).
- Identifying introduction to literature review techniques (thematic, chronological, conceptual).
- Guided session on note-taking and summarizing research papers.
- Interactive session regarding developing research questions and hypotheses.
- Guided session on writing a strong thesis statement and argument development.

Drafting Term Paper

- Peer review session on thesis statements and argument flow.
- Hands-on interactive session on writing for body paragraphs and conclusion.

Semester End Exam:

- Assessment of research attitude and aptitude of research scholar
- Quality of initial draft and subsequent improvisation. Etc.
